Supply List

Material: Unbleached muslin, material for dress, hair bows, white material for daisy, yellow flannel.
Hair - Lion Brand Yarn, Homespun, Color - Candy Apple
Embroidery Thread: Brown #5471, red #347, thread that matches dress, off white or natural
Paint - Black & white acrylic paint, Folkart Acrylic Paint - Country Red (cheeks)
5 inch doll needle
Poly-fil stuffing
Decorative button for front of dress
Mechanical Pencil
Disappearing ink fabric pen
Sandpaper
For Staining - instant coffee, vanilla extract, fragrance oil.
Sponge brush
Paper towels and paper plates
Cardstock (for tag)
Small safety pin
Wooden green flower stem
Basic sewing materials
Optional - old cookie sheet, glass jar with lid, wax paper, pliers, long beading needle (see #1 of face instructions)

Daisy Dew

Read through all directions before beginning.

Doll:

#1. Body: On doubled muslin, with a mechanical pencil lightly trace completely around body patterns. Sew directly on the traced lines; leave open where indicated. Cut out about 1/4 inch away from sewn lines. Clip curves and turn. Stuff head and body firmly and sew opening closed.

#2. Arms: Stuff arms and legs to stuffing line (indicated on pattern) firmly. Sew openings closed. Attach arms where indicated on pattern.

***The legs are not attached yet as

they need to be painted. Painting them is easier before they are attached to the body.

#3. Stain body and arms; see section on staining below.

#4. Legs: Attach a loop of thread to top of legs (this is for hanging to dry). Mix 1/3 cup water with 1 Tablespoon white paint and mix thoroughly. Paint entire leg white and hang to dry.

#5. Shoes: Trace around template on foot and draw shoe line (see leg pattern) with mechanical pencil. Paint shoe black leaving where you outlined the template white. Hang to dry.

NOTE: I use an old wire hanger; just bend both sides up and hang one leg on each side. Be sure to hang where any droppings of paint (if any) will not harm carpet, etc. #6. When legs are dry, sew to body where indicated on pattern.

Staining:

Combine $\frac{1}{4}$ cup instant coffee, 2 cups hot water, 2 Tablespoons Vanilla extract and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon fragrance oil (Some of my preferred scents are cinnamon bun, sugar cookies, and vanilla) in a glass jar with lid. Shake for few minutes until thoroughly mixed. (See the supply list on back of pattern cover for some suggested places for purchasing fragrance oils.) If the scent is not strong enough for your preference, add another 1/8 teaspoon of fragrance oil and continue this until the scent is to your liking. However, I would suggest only adding 1/8 teaspoon of fragrance oil each time because if you add too much and the scent is too strong for you, you will have to start over. Line an old cookie sheet with old rags and lay your doll here. With a sponge brush, thoroughly coat the doll. Bake for 10 minutes at 200 degrees. Check often as this can catch on fire. If you have to bake longer, only bake at 5 minute increments and always KEEP checking the oven. Tip: DO NOT turn your doll over while in the oven...unless you want big black splotches (of course some prim crafters might want these). I know this from experience.

Face:

#1. Eyes: Print and cut out the eyes (in pattern section). Position these on the face where you want them and pin them to the face with straight pins. Very lightly trace around these with a mechanical pencil. With a very small brush and using your black acrylic paint, very slowly outline eyes first and then fill in. Once that has dried, using your medium point white paint pen, place the dots in the eyes where indicated in the picture. Tip - you can also use the end of a small paintbrush...dip the end lightly in your off white paint and place dots in eyes.

#2. Mouth: Follow instructions given in "Facial Features" in pattern section. Thread your 3-inch doll needle with 1 strand of your brown embroidery thread. Going in at the very top of her head (this will be covered up with her hair) embroider the mouth using a simple backstitch.

#3. Nose: Follow instructions given in "Facial Features" in pattern section. Print and cut out nose pattern. Position on face and pin using straight pins. Very lightly trace around this with a mechanical pencil. Using a double strand of red embroidery thread and using same technique as in step #2, backstitch the nose. Tip - I usually unthread my doll needle here and rethread on a smaller, sharper needle. This helps me stay in the lines of the nose.

#4. Eyebrows & Eyelashes: With a mechanical pencil and using the picture as a pattern, trace in eyebrows and eyelashes. Thread your doll needle with a single strand of brown embroidery thread and use the same technique as in step #2 backstitch the eyelashes first and then the eyebrows.

#5. Cheeks: Dip some country red paint onto paper plate. Dip your stencil brush lightly into the paint and pounce off most of it onto the paper towels. Unless you want her cheeks very bright, be sure to pounce off MOST of the paint. If her cheeks are not colorful enough for you, you can always add more...but begin by applying only a small amount. With your stencil brush and checking picture on pattern for placement of cheeks, in a circling motion, paint on cheeks.

Tag: Print out tags on white cardstock. I've given you several tags; stain them all and choose the one you like best. Using the stain mixture given above, either spray or use your sponge brush, and coat entire tag. Bake at 200 degrees for 5 minutes.

Hair:

- #1. Cut small strands of thread that matches the hair and insert into places indicated on head; leave them lying open.
- #2. Making hair bundles: Wrap yarn around your 4 wide spread fingers 10 times, cut. Make 10 bundles.
- #3. Place each hair bundle in the center of the thread strands and tie tightly. Cut Loops.
- #4. Push this hair towards her face, cut 4 more thread stands and place evenly across the back of her head directly behind the first row. Tie the remaining 4 hair bundles hair.
- #5. Tie each side up in high pigtails.

Dress:

- #1. Print and cut out the bodice and skirt patterns.
- #2. Bodice - On double layer material, right sides together, pin bodice pattern and cut out, being sure to place the bodice on the fold as indicated. Cut out opening for head.
- #3. Skirt - On doubled layer material, right sides together, pin skirt pattern and cut out.
- #4. Doing front and back separately, take one piece of the cut out skirts and sew a gathering or a running stitch about 1/4" away from one long edge.
- #5. Gather that part of the skirt and with right sides together match it to the bottom of the bodice. Pin & sew right above the gathering stitch.
- #6. Do the same for the other side of the bodice.
- #7. With right sides together, match up the front and back dress pieces and, using 1/4 inch seam allowance, sew together.
- #8. Turn hem under 1/4 inch and hem.
- #9. Turn bottom of sleeves up about 1/4 inch and hand sew.
- #10. Position button where you want it and sew on leaving threads in front hanging down.
- #11. Slip dress on over doll's head. Turn neckline under and hand sew a few stitches on either side of neck.
- #12. Tie a button to front with knot in front of button.

Bloomers:

- #1. On doubled unbleached muslin, trace pattern with mechanical pencil.
- #2. Sew on traced lines, outside as well as inside seams. Cut out about 1/4 inch from sewn lines. Clip curves and turn.
- #3. Turn waistline down 1/4 inch and hem.
- #4. Trim bottom of legs with pinking shears to length desired. One inch up from bottom of each leg, with matching embroidery thread, run a gather stitch around. Pull to gather.
- #5. Run a gathering stitch around waistline and pull to gather.

Hair Bow (make 2):

- #1. Print and cut out the hair bow pattern. On doubled material, right sides together, pin bow pattern and trace with mechanical pencil.
- #2. Sew on traced lines all the way around - do not leave an opening. Cut out about 1/4 inch from sewn lines.
- #3. In very center of one side, cut a small opening (this will be the bottom of the bow, towards her head) and turn. Hand sew opening closed. Press.
- #4. On back side, hand sew a gather stitch up the bow and pull to gather. Cut a small strip of material and wrap around the gathering, tie in back.
- #5. Sew or glue to pigtails.

Daisy:

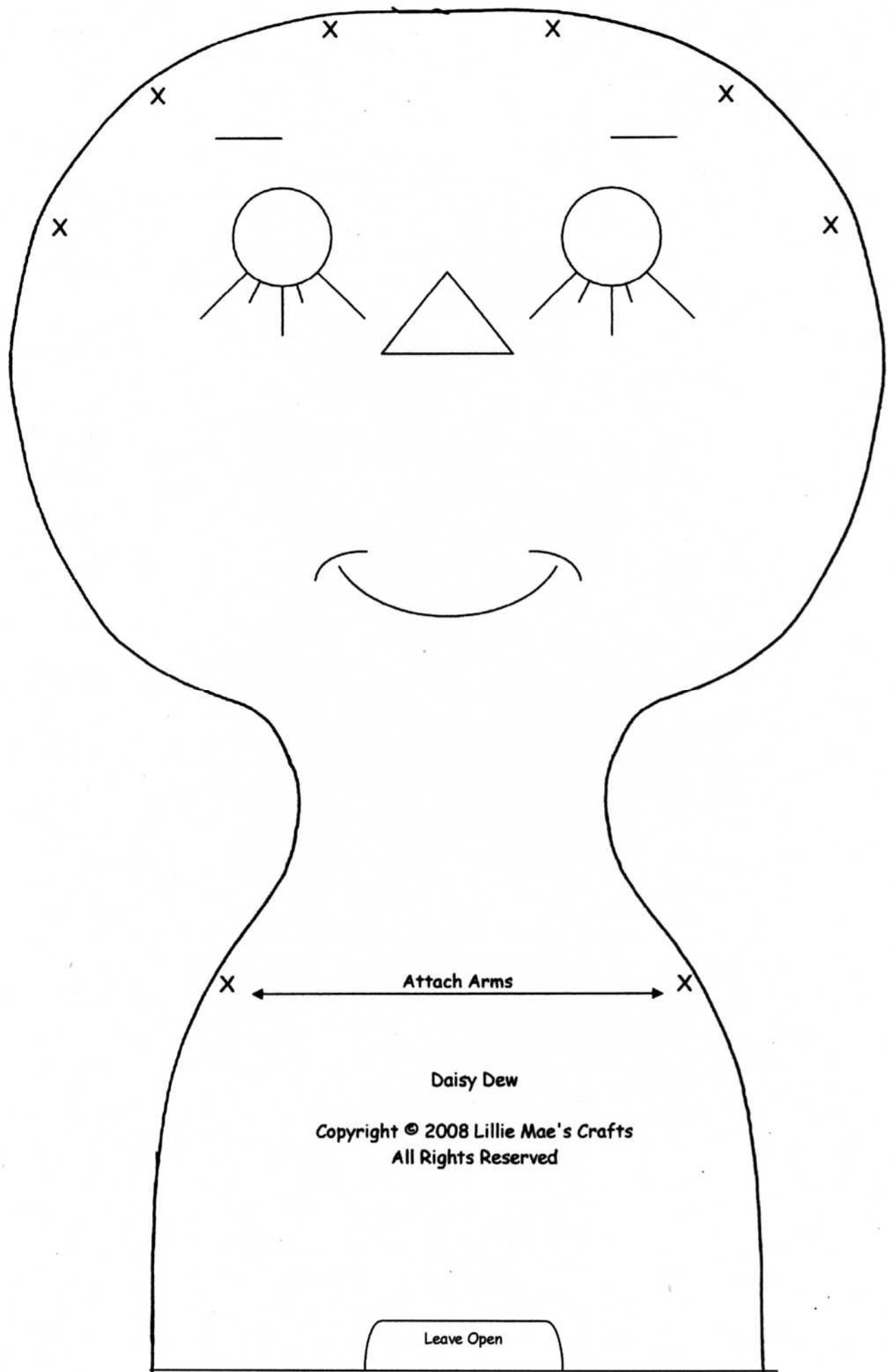
- #1. Trace daisy pattern on doubled white material, sew on traced lines (do not leave an opening). Cut out 1/4 inch away from sewn lines, cut small slit in back for turning. Turn. Stuff firmly.
- #2. Print out both centers. Trace large center on doubled yellow flannel.
- #3. Place printed out small center pattern in the very center of the yellow flannel center (just traced) and trace this with disappearing fabric pen. Sew on these lines. Make a small slit in center of back. Do not turn. Stuff firmly, do not sew opening closed yet.

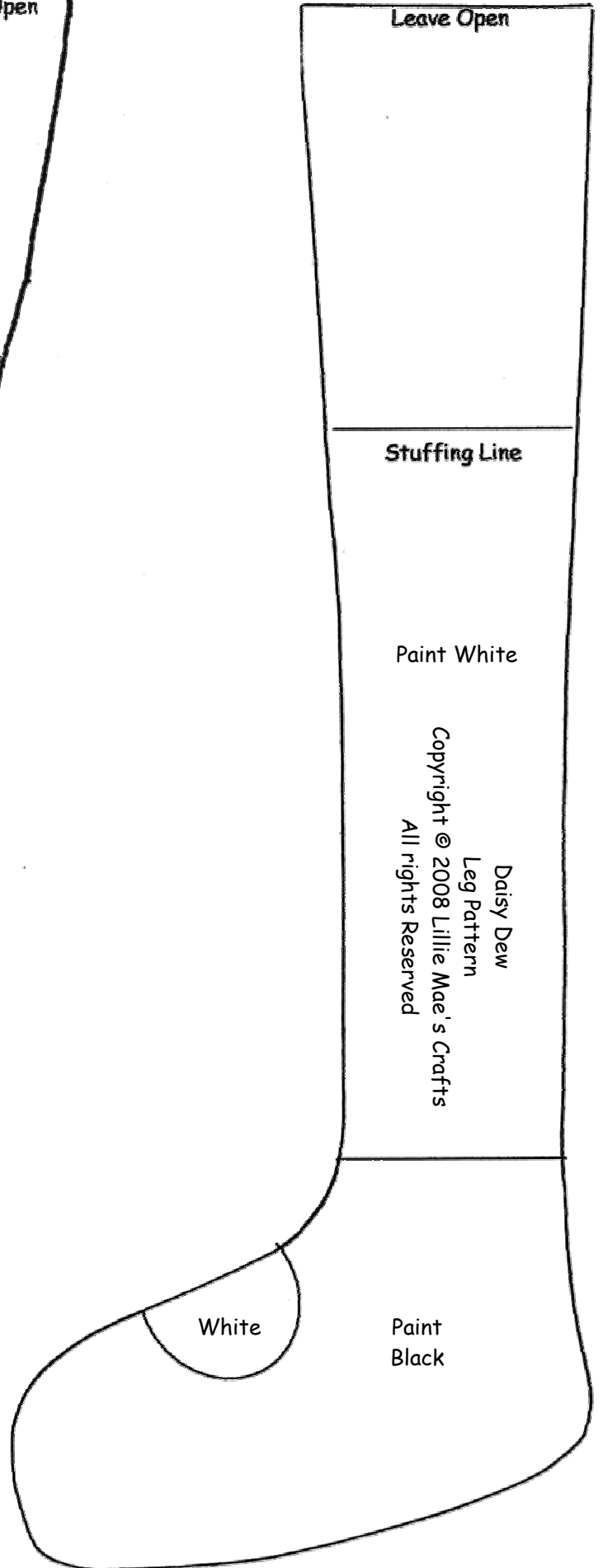
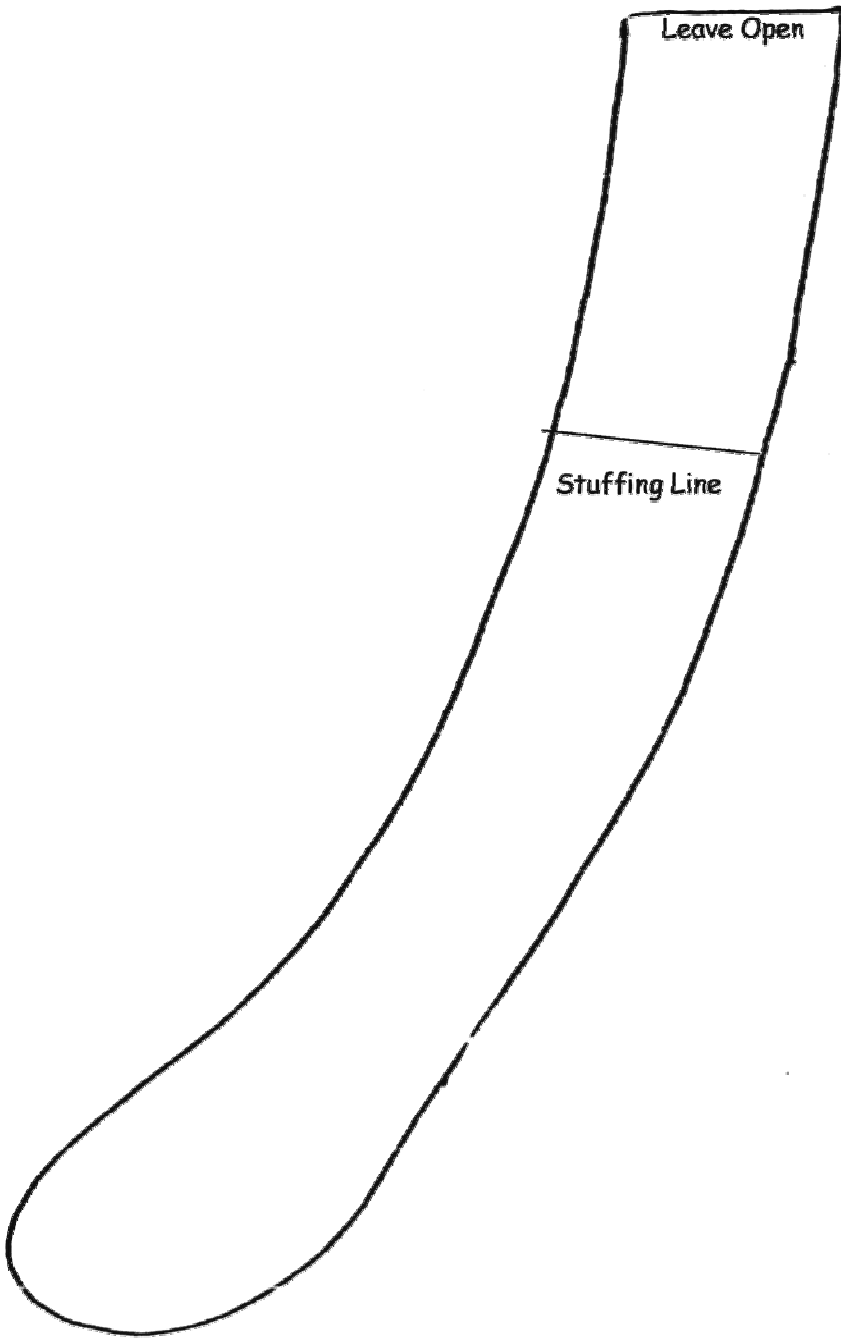
#4. Hand stitch on the lines just drawn with the disappearing fabric pen. Make small slits in outside overhang of center yellow flannel. Take fingernails and scrape along edges of the slits to fray out material.
#5. Stain and bake at 250 for 10 minutes. Bake for another 10 minutes if you feel necessary.
#6. Stick 7-1/2 inch long green wooden flower stem in center of cut slit in back, hot glue and hot glue. Sew opening closed up over wooden stem.

Dress Pattern

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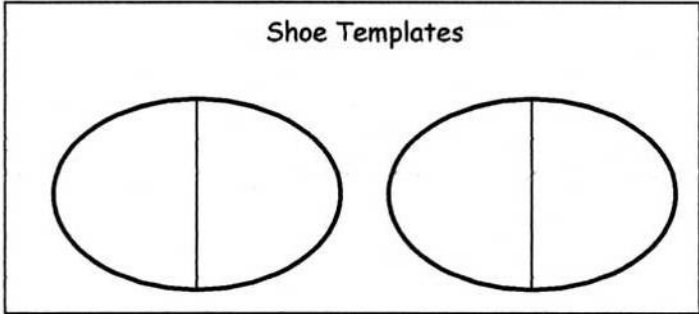
Skirt part of dress
8 x 11-1/2 piece of paper

Pattern for skirt part of dress is a simple 8 x 11-1/2 piece of paper. Place on fold where indicated and trace 2 on doubled material.

The widest part, the sides that were placed on the fold, is the section to be gathered and attached to the bodice.

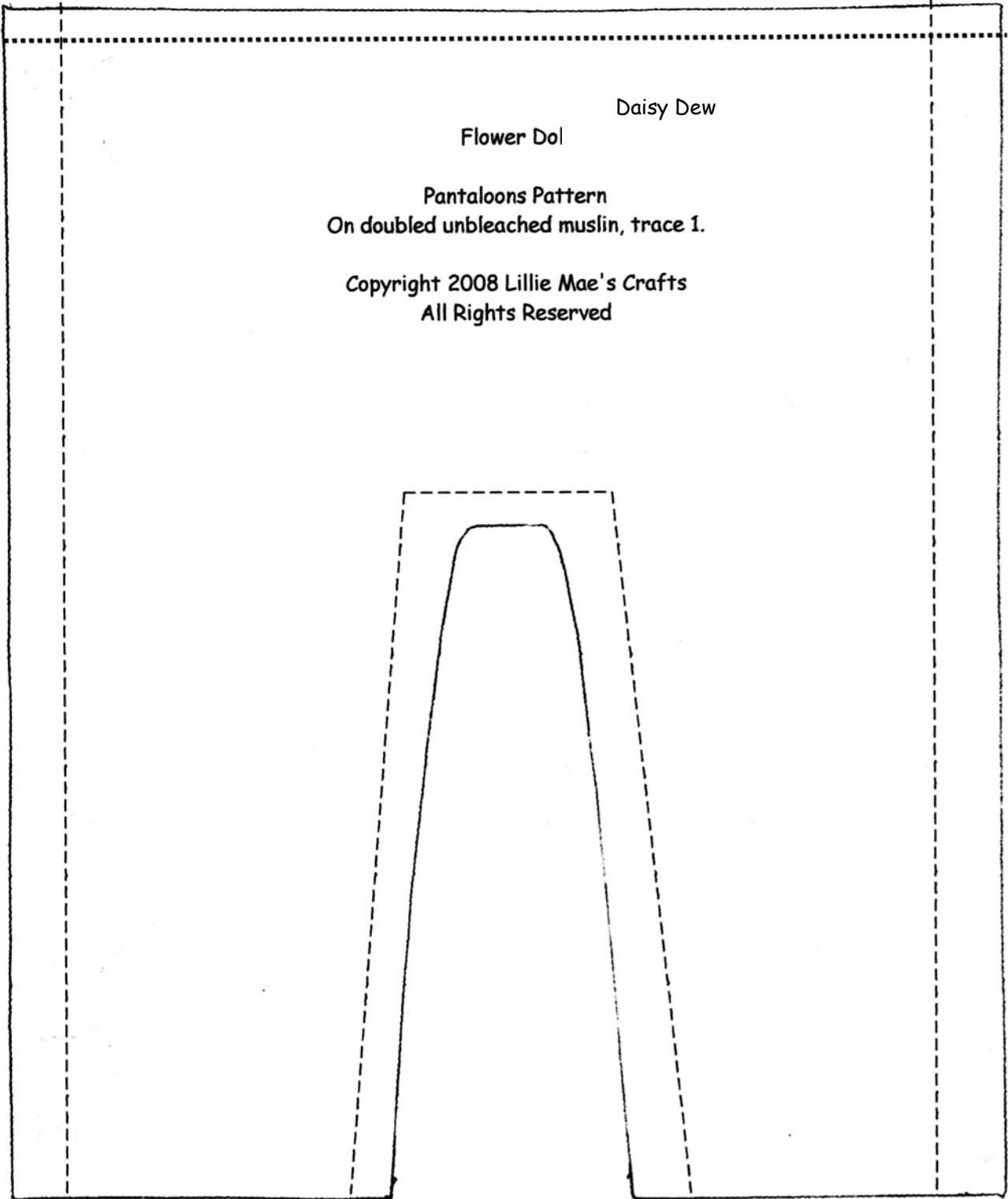

On doubled unbleached muslin, trace 1.

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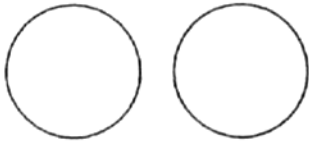


Facial Features

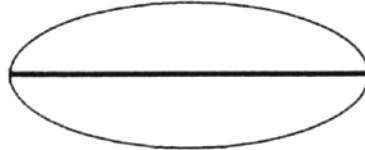
Eyes and Nose: Print and cut out pattern below. Position on face where desired (see picture and head pattern) and attach to doll's head with straight pins. Be sure the eyes are even. Trace lightly around eyes and nose patterns with pencil. See instructions to finish these.

Mouth: Print and cut out mouth pattern on cardstock. Position on face where desired (see picture and head pattern). It is the bottom part of the mouth pattern that you will be tracing onto the doll's head so be sure this is centered on the head and exactly where you want it. Attach to doll's head with straight pins. Lightly trace around the bottom part of the mouth pattern going up sides and ending at the point where the bold line in the center of the mouth pattern is. To get the "dimples" on sides of mouth, line up the sides of the mouth pattern where you would like the dimples or curves of the mouth to go and lightly trace with pencil. See instructions to finish the mouth.
